Five key considerations:

- 1. No one-size-fits-all solution
- 2. Having a systematic way to capture and utilise those results
- 3. Resource-intensive and long-term process
- 4. Dedicated communication action
- 5. Changing the mindset

Communication: Promote your action and results

Inform, promote and communicate your activities and results







Capitalisation calls

From a targeted promotion to the transfer of concrete cooperation outputs



- To identify the most successful project outputs/good practices, and support their re-use
- To disseminate project results towards new stakeholders, new geographic area or through thematic approach
- To stimulate synergies with other initiatives (within or outside Interreg)
- To enrich the existing projects with **targeted actions**, or to adapt to **unforeseen contexts** or crises
- To stimulate the better knowledge of project results at a higher level, in order to change public policies



Capitalisation calls

From a targeted promotion to the transfer of concrete cooperation outputs



- Open vs Restricted
- Capitalising one project (e.g. extension for transfer), or gathering several on a same topic
- Examples of criteria:
 Quality of results and visibility at cross-border level
 Outputs in all languages of the programme
 Capitalise on outputs from another fund
 Bring newcomers to Interreg
 Establish a link with policy/strategy level...

Thematic communities What for?



Gather knowledge and expertise on key programme thematic objectives

- to encourage the transfer of project results to other areas or types of stakeholder
- to facilitate continued engagement after project end
- to influence public policy (mainstreaming/policy change)



Thematic capitalisation Programme and projects aligned





Enhance visibility of project achievements at programme level

- Kick-off, thematic events/webinars, articles/publications, policy briefs
- Dedicated activities planned at project level to support prog cap

Win-win - Not to be seen as only a constraint for project partners

- Reach what could not be achieved at individual project level
- Enhanced access to stakeholders through mapping
- External expertise, training
- Stronger voice within and outside of Interreg

Clarifying Concepts



Synergies: Working together makes things better. 1+1=3

When programmes or funds team up, they can do more than they could alone by sharing what they have and working as one.

Capitalisation: Learning from success.

It's about taking good ideas from one project and sharing them so others can use them too. This means collecting information about what worked well and telling others about it.

Mainstreaming: Making good ideas stick and sustainable.

When a project comes up with something useful, mainstreaming means making that idea a regular part of how things are done in regions, countries, or the EU. This helps the good ideas continue to help people even after the project ends.

Clarifying Roles – MA/JS (1)




- Guiding role provide framework and tools for capitalisation
- Education towards beneficiaries quality enforcer, with specific mandatory criteria
- Convey programme objectives and expectations get partners on board
- Knowledge holder responsible of the overview of all results + communicate them
- Supporting projects in the communication and visibility of their results
- Provide opportunities to build on result, e.g. capitalisation calls
- Dedicate resources to drive capitalisation thematic expertise, understanding of knowledge created
- Networking opportunities supporting creation of new partnership, new ideas



Clarifying Roles – MA/JS (2)

- Partnership principle of Programme bodies
- Establish roles of all programme bodies in programme strategy complementarity
 Support engagement and mindset change
- Ad-hoc solutions bridging, channeling outstanding results using position as MA Supporting towards national level

Clarifying Roles – MC/NCP



- Partnership principle of Programme bodies
- Facilitator best knowledge of territory, engagement and promotion towards key partners
- Provide dedicated support to programmes to implement capitalisation support mechanism + create conditions for transfer
- Thematic capitalisation events provide platform for results sharing
- Position to be used for promoting Interreg towards mainstream (ERDF) funds, working closely with MA of national funds
 - Also within own institution (at regional level)
- Reinforce communication + awareness among national networks



Clarifying Roles – EC

 Capitalisation on Interreg within Commission – coordination groups between REGIO and other DGs, to be used more.

Especially within CPR


Geographically + Thematically – bring Interreg results closer to thematic DGs

- Reinforce communication about Interreg results e.g. EU Regions week, EU thematic weeks (green, energy) opportunities for promotion outside Interreg
- D2 Border Hub position reach out to DGs re border obstacles + push Interreg solutions
- EU Macro Regional Strategies, key for transnational reach MRS to be more aligned with Interreg + mainstream funds (ERDF, ESF)
- Commission supporting programmes reaching other DGs + EU Parliament

Clarifying Roles – Partnerships



- Make sure they are on board!
 - Understand programme expectations, to better respond to programme needs
- Communicate about their results, ensure their availability and visibility
- Experienced partners act as capitalisation driver / multiplier
- Coordinated by programmes support promotion of results

Why is Capitalization important?

- **❖** Increase the visibility of your projects, your programme and EU funds impact (Interreg) in the border region;
- ❖ Help future projects: generate project ideas, give them the already available studies and documents that can help them in designing their project idea and ensure a successful implementation. Projects can build on other projects knowledge and experience;
- **❖ Better networking** by sharing <u>specific expertise</u>, transfer <u>targeted</u> <u>results</u> and <u>relevant knowledge on thematic fields</u> to a large number of stakeholders;
- **❖** Projects can increase their quality, sustainability and durability of their results;

The programming process was launched in October 2018 by gathering statistical data at the level of the programme area and by the identification of the relevant local and regional strategies to be addressed in the next programming period.

The programming process continued by developing the instruments needed for capitalization at the level of the programme:

- database with the outputs and results of the financed projects in 2007-2013 and 2014-2020
- aggregation of all studies and strategies financed in the previous programming periods on which further investments could be realized
- outstanding projects' results which could be replicated and further built in the border area).

- 2019 was dedicated to drafting the territorial analysis and stakeholders meetings and surveys.
- Even though the programme used capitalization tools to a certain extent for the 2014-2020 projects, in January 2019 the JMC approved the use of capitalisation as a programme management instrument, based on the fact that the programme should start capitalising so that future projects would have access to successful results, knowledge and expertise. From this perspective, the Programme is able also to promote achievements and demonstrate the added-value of cooperation.
- A team of MA, NA and JS representatives was formed in order to deal with capitalization, with clear tasks and deadlines.

In January 2020, the Joint Working Group validated the results of the surveys and the Policy objectives and the specific objectives to be included in the Programme were selected.

In July 2020, the Joint Working Group for Programming approved the first draft version of the Programme, which was afterwards published on the programme website for public consultation until 1st of September 2020.

In October 2020, after publishing the second version of the draft OP, a series of online thematic events - clusters (tourism, culture, health, environment and emergency situations) were organized.

These 4 thematic online workshops were aimed at establishing new partnerships, generate project ideas and disseminate outputs and results from the projects already financed by the Interreg - IPA Cross-border Cooperation Romania-Serbia Programme.

Before the event, participants were encouraged to read the draft Programme available on the programme website, in preparation for dynamic discussions, to have a starting point for their project ideas.

During the event presentations of past success stories were delivered and the participants had the opportunity to ask questions on specific programme implementation or regarding the future programming period.

Capitalization tools

AWARENESS: make sure your projects understand the need and benefits of capitalization. They don't provide only "input" for the process but are also beneficiaries.

BENEFITS:

- generate knowledge, results and outputs that should be promoted and re-used;
- demonstrate the added-value of cross-border cooperation;
- more visibility of their actions, hence increased impact in the border area of their project;

Application Form - special section for "Durability of project outputs and results":

- **❖** How will the project ensure that project outputs and results have a lasting effect beyond project duration?
- ❖ Please describe concrete measures (including institutional structures, financial resources etc.) taken during and after project implementation to ensure and/or strengthen the durability of the project outputs and results.
- ❖ If relevant, explain who will be responsible and/or who will be the owner of results and outputs.

Make sure that projects results are not only transferred but also re-used.

Application Form - special section for "Transferability of project outputs and results":

- **❖** How will the project ensure that project outputs and results are applicable and replicable by other organisations/ regions/ countries outside of the current partnership?
- ❖Please describe to what extent it will be possible to transfer the outputs and results to other organisations/ regions/ countries outside of the current partnership.

Make sure that projects results are not only transferred but also re-used.

- **Project assessment** (questions in the assessment grid): *Is the project planning to have synergies (complementarities) with implemented/ongoing projects (if relevant) carried out under this programme (or other EU-funded programmes)?*
- Quality assessment criteria for OSIs: MANDATORY
- The project clearly contributes to a wider initiative/strategy on one or more policy levels (EU/national/regional) and presents synergies with the relevant national/regional and EU Macro-Regional Strategies (e.g EUSDR).
- The project makes use of available knowledge and builds on existing results and practices (capitalization).

- Monitoring procedures tailored in such a way to enable reflecting the durability and transferability, during the implementation and sustainability period of the project.
- In the **sustainability report** information regarding: durability of project outputs and results and measures taken and problems which have affected the project sustainability.
