

Durability of project results



How is it defined

Harmonised definition

Durability refers to the fact that project achievements will be available/accessible/useful to relevant groups (after the project's lifetime), in order to have a lasting effect on the

territory and the population.

Programmes also talk about

Sustainable development which is understood as an increase in economic activity which respects the environment and uses natural resources harmoniously so that future generations' capacity to meet their own needs is not compromised.



Requirements and agreements

Leagl requirements and programme own agreements

Interreg is part of the ERDF fund family, therefore, the set rules for funds also apply. In addition, programmes with the support of Interact have developed harmonised implementation tools (HIT), that is the basis for the joint monitoring system.

Interreg Regulation (EU 2021/1059)



CPR (EU 2021/1060) – Articles 65 & 66

Article 65: No major change within 5 years after final payment. Article 66: Investment must stay within the region; relocation = ineligibility + repayment risk.

Harmonised Approach via HIT Tools

From applications, to assessment, to final report and control.





Harmonised approach - Harmonised Implementation Tools (HIT)

- Best-practice templates and tools for Interreg programmes and cover the full life-cycle of projects.
- Co-created, meaning they are agreed best practice templates and tools that have been simplified for use by Interreg programmes.
- Easier for applicants to apply in different Interreg programmes, and for programmes to learn from each other.
- Offer a sound basis to build the monitoring system, and helps to provide structured data for Keep.eu.

Harmonised approach

Application Form:

Quality Assessment Criteria:

Assessment of the project's potential for long-term impact and sustainability during the selection process.

Final Report:

C.3.1: How outputs will be maintained and made available.

C.4.2: Long-term cooperation to sustain project results (e.g., institutional structures, action plans, strategic alignment).

Control Report and Checklist:

Verification of the continued use and maintenance of project outputs post-completion.
