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

Our road to higher project quality - establishing Working Groups

- We looked at EC's midterm review and our own priorities – defense, AI, critical materials, labor market, green-blue infrastructure
- Brainstorming about project ideas and partners (2-3)
 - keeping it lean and mean
- Program partner (1), regional antenna (1), participants from program area (4-8), MA/JS contribution PP!



Why these working groups?

- The quality of projects is often inferior not meeting the standards
- We strive for an offer-oriented approach
- Active approach to accelerate high-quality project development instead of wait-and-see
- Writing done by external affiliated consultancy and/or consortium

What we are aiming for

At least one strategic project before Nov 2025

- One-pager as soon as project idea gets shape
- 4 million ERDF reserved per working group may be two smaller projects of each 2 million
- Difference: **cooperation with program partners** they are the key actors
