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Outlines

The meeting will bring together Interreg programmes using or considering small projects implemented directly or through a Small Project Fund (SPF), to exchange practical experience and discuss their future role in Interreg.

The first day will combine the financial and implementation perspective with a broader discussion on the role of small projects in strengthening the local dimension of territorial cooperation. We will also discuss practices and simplification regarding small projects management.

Particular attention will be given to simplified implementation methods, SCOs and draft budgets, including experience from audits and controls.

The meeting will also look beyond the current programming period and discuss the place of small projects and SPF Post 2027, including opportunities and requirements emerging from the proposed regulatory framework.

The second day of event will focus on Community-Led Local Development (CLLD) and explore whether elements of the CLLD approach could provide inspiration for the future development of Small Project Funds, including ideas emerging from the European Commission and OECD.

Objective

The objective of the meeting is to exchange practical experience implementing small projects and SPFs, identify approaches that simplify delivery while maintaining sound financial management, and discuss how SPFs can further strengthen the local dimension of Interreg.

The meeting will also provide a space for programmes to jointly reflect on the future of Small Project Funds after 2027 and identify elements that should be considered when designing the next generation of Interreg programmes.

The nearest metro stations to the venue are Staroměstská (Green Line) and Můstek (Yellow Line – approximately a 10–12-minute walk).



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Travel

In Prague, **it is important to use only official taxi services from the airport**. Uber Airport is the official taxi service at Prague Airport – you can order a ride via the app or directly at the airport. In the city, we kindly recommend not using taxis from the street, but only pre-booked services such as Bolt or Uber, or official taxis with prices announced in advance.

Tickets for public transport can be purchased from ticket machines (usually accepting coins and cards). On some trams and buses, you can also buy a ticket directly on board by card, but this option is not always available.

You can also buy a 24-hour ticket (150 CZK – around EUR 6) or a 72-hour ticket (350 CZK – around EUR 14). These tickets are valid for all trams, buses and metro services, including regular public transport to and from the airport.

NOTE: Public transport tickets are not valid for the Airport Express (AE). A separate ticket is required and costs 200 CZK (approx. EUR 8). It can be purchased directly on the bus or via the České dráhy app.

Getting around Prague

Prague city centre is compact and easy to navigate on foot. The city also has an extensive and reliable public transport network consisting of metro, trams and buses. Most key attractions and the meeting venue are within walking distance or easily accessible by public transport.

Accommodation

Participants are expected to arrange their own accommodation.

There is a wide range of hotels and other accommodation options in Prague city centre. We recommend booking accommodation in Prague 1 or 2, particularly in the Old Town (Staré Město), New Town (Nové Město) or around the Můstek and Náměstí Republiky areas. Early booking is recommended, as centrally located hotels can be in high demand.

Other Information

Prague is a historic European capital known for its well-preserved architecture, vibrant cultural life and walkable historic centre. The Old Town and surrounding areas offer a wide selection of restaurants, cafés, bars and cultural attractions.

Practical information

Weather in October: typically cool and variable, with daytime temperatures around 10–15°C. Mornings and evenings can be considerably cooler, and rain is possible.

Currency: Czech koruna (CZK)

Payment: Card payments and mobile wallets are widely accepted in hotels, restaurants, shops and most other establishments. However, it may be useful to carry a small amount of Czech koruna in cash.
