Interreg projects often start as practical cooperation pilots, but also its strategic value lies in changing the **rules, procedures and governance arrangements** that shape how territories function. These changes may take different forms: operational protocols, technical annexes, cross-border agreements, joint booking or referral procedures, action plans, local ordinances, mutual-recognition arrangements, administrative simplification, and, in some cases, legislative or regulatory adaptation

In areas such as **healthcare, education, employment services and tourism**, Interreg can help territories move from cooperation pilots to more **systemic transformation**: new protocols, cross-border service agreements, joint action plans, simplified administrative procedures, mutual-recognition arrangements, local rules, and, where needed, changes in regional, national or European regulations.

The discussion will show how Interreg acts as a **testing ground for transformation**: identifying what works in real territories, building trust between institutions, and provide models that public authorities can scale up.

- Healthcare: ambulance protocols, patient referral systems, cross-border hospital services, joint booking procedures, reimbursement arrangements, shared medical teams.
- Education and VET: cross-border curricula, joint vocational training, recognition of qualifications, youth mobility rules, cooperation between schools, training centres and employers.
- Employment services: cross-border labour-market data, skills matching, one-stop shops for workers, social security and taxation issues, telework arrangements, solutions to labour shortages.
- Tourism: sustainable tourism action plans, cross-border permits, recognition of tour-guide qualifications, visitor-management rules, mobility solutions, climate-adapted destination strategies.
